

PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I recently had breakfast with a friend of mine who has profound memory loss. She still recognizes me, and I am grateful for that. When the scrambled eggs, bacon, and pancakes came, I cut them up to make it easier for her to eat them. I put some eggs on her fork and put the fork into her hand. She started eating and did pretty good on her own after that. Things we take for granted like eating a nice breakfast can be a real challenge for someone who doesn't remember the sequence of actions required.

Something she still enjoys is receiving Holy Communion. A Eucharistic Minister brings her Holy Communion every Wednesday and she truly looks forward to receiving our Lord. As we hear Jesus say in this Sunday's Gospel, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world" (John 6:51).

I pray for all of you, my beloved parishioners. However, I have a special place in my heart for all of you who are suffering from memory loss, and for all of you who are caring for them.

Even though it has been three years since my mother's death, I can still remember that while she was alive I had asked the Lord why my mother had to suffer the loss of her memory. It was so difficult to see this extremely intelligent woman not know her own son and daughter. It was difficult to watch her unable to remember how to do the most basic things in life. "Why, Lord, did she have to suffer like this?" All I heard back was, "She's still your mother." That simple response made all the difference. "She is still your mother. Even if she can no longer do the things she used to do, love your mother." It reminded me of Jesus on the Cross addressing his mother, "Woman, behold, your son." And to John, the beloved disciple, "Behold, your mother" (John 19:26-27). I felt the Lord say, "Joseph, behold, your mother."

As we eat the Body of Christ and drink his Blood, may our Lord strengthen our faith and help us love our mother, and our brothers and our sisters, now and forever.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.



THE COMMUNION RITE

Reception of Communion

The Lord addresses an invitation to us, urging us to receive him in the sacrament of the Eucharist: "Truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of man and drink his blood, you have no life in you." In the communion, preceded by the Lord's prayer and the breaking of the bread, the faithful receive "the bread of heaven" and "the cup of salvation," the body and blood of Christ who offered himself "for the life of the world": Because this bread and wine have been made Eucharist "we call this food Eucharist, and no one may take part in it unless he believes that what we teach is true, has received baptism for the forgiveness of sins and new birth, and lives in keeping with what Christ taught."



The principal fruit of receiving the Eucharist in Holy Communion is an intimate union with Christ Jesus. Indeed, the Lord said: "He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him." What material food produces in our bodily life, Holy Communion wonderfully achieves in our spiritual life. Communion with the flesh of the risen Christ, a flesh "given life and giving life through the Holy Spirit," preserves, increases, and renews the life of grace received at Baptism. This growth in Christian life needs the nourishment of Eucharistic Communion, the bread for our pilgrimage until the moment of death, when it will be given to us as viaticum. The body of Christ we receive in Holy Communion is "given up for us," and the blood we drink "shed for the many for the forgiveness of sins." For this reason, the Eucharist cannot unite us to Christ without at the same time cleansing us from past sins and preserving us from future sins. As bodily nourishment restores lost strength, so the Eucharist strengthens our charity, which tends to be weakened in daily life; and this living charity wipes away venial sins. By giving himself to us, Christ revives our love and enables us to break our disordered attachments to creatures and root ourselves in him.

The Eucharist makes the Church. Through it Christ unites them to all the faithful in one body — the Church. St. Augustine exhorts us: If you are the body and members of Christ, then it is your sacrament that is placed on the table of the Lord; it is your sacrament that you receive. To that which you are you respond "Amen" ("yes, it is true!") and by responding to it you assent to it. For you hear the words, "the Body of Christ" and respond "Amen." Be then a member of the Body of Christ that your Amen may be true.

POSTURE CHANGE DURING THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

From time to time it is worthwhile to examine why we do the things we do. This is especially true for us Catholics who wish to show proper reverence and awe for the Most Holy Eucharist. We know that what we do at Sacred Liturgy forms us, and others who observe us, in ways that sometimes supersedes words! This is especially true with bodily postures.



Some people point to an informality that continues to foster itself in our society: our casual manner in the way we address people by using only first names, our relaxed attire at social engagements and not “dressing up,” and the fact that we do not stand up when someone of importance walks into a room. It can also creep unconsciously into our celebration of Liturgy.

In order to counter this indifference and help foster a sense of awe and gratitude for the gift of the Eucharist, Bishop Vann has asked that we make a change in our posture during the latter part of the Eucharistic Prayer. Currently we stand from the Great Amen until after receiving Holy Communion. **The faithful are now asked to start kneeling after the Lamb of God (*Agnus Dei*)** in awe and veneration of what is taking place on the Altar of Sacrifice. This change is to be implemented in parishes by the last Sunday in August and will help us to prepare ourselves spiritually for the dedication of our Cathedral, where this posture change will become normative. **(St. Bonaventure will implement this change on the weekend of August 25-26.)**

There are occasions when this posture won't be possible, such as when an individual is prevented by ill health, or for reasons of lack of space, of the large number of people present, or for another reasonable cause. It might not be possible in our communities that are worshipping in temporary worships spaces that don't enjoy the use of kneelers. However, we can all enjoy a heightened awareness and attentiveness to the sacred action. Through our increased mindfulness of “doing things differently,” this change in posture will hopefully help us become more conscious and intentional about our sense of reverence and awe of Jesus' Body and Blood.

This posture change is in keeping with the directives that we have been given in the General Instruction to the Roman Missal (GIRM), which is the “instruction manual” for how we celebrate Mass. The directives in the GIRM give us both universal norms for the Roman Catholic Church as well as “particular law” for the United States. It also gives authority to a Diocesan Bishop to establish norms for the benefit and well-being of the faithful for his particular diocese, which may vary from the surrounding dioceses and change over time. Our gestures and postures help to bring about a unity as we all do things the same way at the same time. It also helps to make clear the meanings of different parts of the Mass and fosters our participation in our Sacred Liturgy. Let all that we do help us enter into our prayer and worship to bring about our sanctification and that of our world. —*Office for Worship, Diocese of Orange*



CHURCH RENOVATION UPDATE

We have seen a lot of activity from the bidding contractors surveying the work to be done in the church. Bids are due on August 24. There will be a period of time (likely a week) where the bids will be evaluated and a contractor chosen.

Final drawings are with the City. These drawings reflect the changes requested by the different Huntington Beach planning offices and are expected to be approved with no substantial changes.

The logistics team has been very busy planning the move from the church into the parish hall and is making progress on those preparations. The plan is to use the hall conference room as a worship chapel where the tabernacle will reside. Some work is being done in that room to prepare the sacred space.

In the near future we will move the St. Bonaventure and St. Francis statues from the north and south sides of the church to the enclosed patio on the east side of the parish center. We will also place four 20-foot storage bins near the existing storage bins by the HOPE office.

That's all for now. Again, please pray for a successful transition and for the whole parish in this time of change.

TRADICIONES DE NUESTRA FE

Santa Rosa (Isabel Flores de Oliva) fue canonizada en 1667 como la primera santa americana. Ella encarnaba la expresión "Gracias a Dios". Esta frase la utilizan muchos latinos cuando reciben un cumplido o halago, para reconocer que sus talentos y virtudes se deben a Dios que bendice sus esfuerzos. Ellos, como Santa Rosa, aceptan las limitaciones de su condición humana pero también aceptan la gracia de ser hijas e hijos del Dios que siempre nos ayuda. —Fray Gilberto Cavazos-Gl, OFM,
